Ovarian Cyst - Diagnosed

This pathway is for the management of ovarian cysts confirmed by ultrasound scan.

Red Flags

Ovarian cancer

Management

- Pre-pubertal (cyst any size or type) arrange gynaecology assessment.
- 2. Any age (cyst solid, complex, or > 5 cm) order Ca125 at gynaecology assessment.
- 3. **Pre-menopausal** (cyst < 5 cm and simple/haemov) patient:

Simple cyst

- Unilocular, not septated, and no solice imponents.
- Asymptomatic simple cysts < 5 cm in pre-menopausal women do not require ultrasour follow-up.1
- Simple cysts (< 5 cm) in premenopausal women are low risk of malignancy.

4. Post-menoususal (cyst is < 5 cm and simple/haemorrhagic) − check Canas.

Simple cyst

- Simple cysts (< 5 cm) in post-menopausal women are low risk of malignancy.
- If > 35 units per mL, arrange gynaecology assessment.
- if < 35 units per mL, repeat scan and Ca125 in 4 months.
 - If the repeat scan shows the cyst has increased or Ca125 > 35 units per mL, arrange gynaecology assessment.
 - If the repeat scan shows the cyst remains, but has not increased in size or developed any suspicious features, and Ca125 < 35, arrange a further scan and Ca125 in 4

months. These investigations can be repeated up to a maximum of three times.

Third repeated scan in post-menopausal women

After the third repeated scan:

- if there is still concern, arrange gynaecology assessment.
- if there is no change, these investigations can stop.
