




Jordon Denison

I believe there needs to be more tāne Māori takatāpui representation in our mental health services for whai ora to feel comfortable to reach out and ask for help.





Ena Rudolph


Ena Rudolph has worked with Timatanga Hou Detox Unit at Dargaville Hospital as a Health Care Assistant for almost five years.


Karen recognises there is a shortage of Clinical Coders in New Zealand and only three Māori Coders.

She intended to complete the required Challenge Exam (Medical Terminology) prior to starting the Introductory ICD10–AM ACHI and ACS (Clinical Coding).

Unfortunately, she failed the exam which then meant she needed to complete the prerequisite Medical Terminology course.

After being diagnosed with breast cancer in August 2022, she put her studies on hold to focus on her health, returning to work full time in January 2023. Due to the demands of everyday life, she has not managed to pick up her studies yet, however, intends to complete this course early next year.

Once completed Karen aims to start the introductory ICD10–AM ACHI and ACS course in July 2024. This qualification is based in Australia and is the only Australasian Clinical Coding qualification.



Miriana Katene


Miriana Katene is originally from Rotorua but has been residing in the Far North for the last seven years.

Robyn Cooper has been working as a Community Support Worker in the mental health field for 20 years.


With support from the JRBM scholarship, Robyn has completed a Bachelor of Nursing studying at Te Pūkenga – NorthTec in Whangārei.

Daniel Manihera


Daniel has completed a Bachelor of Nursing in 2022 with support from the JRBM Unregulated Health Workers Fund.


Since completing the NESP programme Daryn has gone on to Community Mental Health Nursing for the Kaupapa Māori service, Te Roopu Whitiora.
